

FEDERAL PADLOCK CLOSES 25 BARS IN JUST 21 MINUTES

Eight Newark Places Included
in Decree by U. S.
Judge

Eight Newark bars were among the 25 in the State ordered padlocked yesterday by Federal Judge Fake. It took but 21 minutes for the court to decree all 25 locks. Most of them were consent decrees, in which the defendants consented

to the proceedings, and were given two weeks to file a motion to modify the order, permitting the places to be opened for legitimate business under heavy bond, subject to frequent inspection.

The Newark places affected are those of Gus Beck, 324 Springfield avenue; Joseph Bell, 343 Washington street; William Donnelly, 68 Commerce street; Joseph Glynn, 435 Broad street; Peter Gordziewski, 165 Wilson avenue; Hugo Harringer, 296 Sixteenth avenue; Jacob Handelman, 211 Bloomfield avenue, and Benjamin Franklin Smith, 255 Broome street.

Four padlocks go to the Jersey City doors of Frank Donnelly, 815 Newark avenue; Barney Graybowski, 138 Garfield avenue; Stanley Kupnijanczik, 118 Essex street; and Joseph Lombardi, 41 Maxwell street.

Other places ordered locked were
