

DORAN PROMISES JERSEY BEER DRIVE

tention is being paid to the beer traffic, and this summer promises to be a hazardous one for dealers in that beverage.

NO WORSE THAN ELSEWHERE

"New Jersey is a pretty decent state," he said, "and Newark is probably no worse than any other large city."

He added that the police and county authorities here are co-operating well with his department, and will be called upon for further co-operation this summer, "although we are not attempting to shift the burden of enforcement to the shoulders of local authorities."

Dr. Doran declared that May was a banner month in the matter of captures and court victories for Captain Ross, and that he looked upon the success of his department with the industrial alcohol situation as an outstanding accomplishment.

"Most of the pirates have been driven out," he said, "and the legitimate manufacturers are aiding us in every way."

ALCOHOL NOT PROBLEM

"The industrial alcohol problem is not a major one any more" he remarked, "and it used to be the problem. Incidentally New Jersey is one of the greatest users of this product, because of its enormous number and variety of manufacturers. Last year this country produced 195,000,000 gallons of industrial alcohol, and of that amount this state used a greater portion than any part of the United States. The situation is in good order, because the manufacturers themselves show a sincere desire to help us."

Earlier in the day, when addressing the New Jersey committee of the Women's Law Enforcement at the Y. W. C. A. Dr. Doran told his hearers that the "stills are getting smaller all the time," and that the "liquor traffic is being pushed from post to post."

"BIG SHOTS" DIMINISH

He believed, he stated, that within the present administration the "big shot" liquor traffic on a wide scale would be merely a matter of history.

On the other hand, he informed the women, the fight against the traffic must center upon bending the will of the people to observe the law through understanding. Alcohol diversion from manufacturing sources is almost ended, he said, and thanked the women for their support of prohibition.
