

## WOMEN TO BE JAILED WHEN ALL MEN ARE IN

Judge Bourquin in Federal Court today declared he would not send any women to jail for liquor violations until "all the men are in jail."

This comment came when he had placed Anna Vitulis, of Jersey City, on probation for five years, and had ordered her to pay a fine of \$150. He had originally sentenced her to serve 60 days in jail.

"I am waiting until all the men are in jail before I start sending the women," he said.

Then he turned to the woman's counsel and asked how long it would take her to pay the fine. The attorney replied that she could pay it at once.

"I ought to have made it a little more," said the Court.

Alex Zembuske, also of Jersey City, who figured in the same case, did not fare so well. He was sentenced to 30 days and to pay \$100 for liquor law violations.

Joseph Cella, of 610 Ohio Avenue, Trenton, pleaded guilty to liquor law

violations and was sentenced to serve 30 days in jail and to pay a fine of \$150. John Vizzial, of 1217 Princeton Avenue, pleaded guilty to dry law violations.

## GIVEN 100 DAYS IN POSTAL EMBEZZLING

## Judge Bourquin to Remain in Trenton

TRENTON—The assignment of Judge Bourquin of Montana to the Federal judicial district of New Jersey has been extended indefinitely according to information received here yesterday from the Department of Justice at Washington. The plan is to prolong the present term of the court in this city with a view to clearing further the congested calendars of the Federal Court.

The official advices from Washington set at rest reports that Judge Bourquin would sit in Newark beginning with the opening of the term in that city Wednesday.

The November term of Federal Court will open Wednesday when the grand jury will be sworn in at the Newark Post-office building by Federal Judge Fake. Assistant United States District Attorney Thomas Arrowsmith will present the cases.

Federal Judge Clark will call the law and equity calendars Wednesday and sit in these cases. Judge Fake will be in his chambers in the Lefcourt building writing opinions and hearing other matters. Federal Judge Avis also will hear criminal matters in Trenton.

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## ACQUITTAL ORDERED ON FEDERAL CHARGE

Judge John Boyd Avis, in the United States District Court this afternoon, directed a verdict of acquittal for John J. Kraus, secretary and treasurer of the Kraus Company of Newark, who was charged with using the mails to defraud.

The trial was started yesterday and was resumed again this morning. The directed verdict was given shortly after court had convened for the afternoon session.

Kraus was accused of sending false financial statements through the mail. He was defended by J. Howard Connor, while Assistant United States Attorney Griggs appeared for the government.

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## SEVERE PENALTIES IMPOSED BY COURT

Judge Bourquin's Policy of  
Heavy Sentences Continued

Judge Bourquin's policy of imposing severe sentences on dry law violators, while he was here for ten weeks, was continued yesterday by Judge John Boyd Avis in the Federal Court.

More than a score of violators, including Trenton men, felt the lash of the court. Only one person, a widow, escaped. She was placed on probation for one year.

Thomas H. Whalen, Sr., of 92 Jackson Street, charged with being the proprietor of a speakeasy on Factory Street, and Fred Lanning, of 220 Mercer Street, his alleged bartender, were each given heavy sentences. Whalen was sentenced to four months in jail and fined \$350, while Lanning was ordered to spend 30 days in jail and pay a \$150 fine.

Mrs. Anna Mosque, of Newark, escaped a jail term after her counsel had pleaded for her. She was placed on probation for one year.

Other Trenton men, too, felt the severity of Judge Avis' sentences after they had pleaded guilty to liquor law violations.

Joseph Stallone, of Trenton, implicated with four other men in a charge of possessing equipment designed for the manufacture of liquor, received a term of six months in jail and was fined \$500.

His companions each were fined \$50. They are: Barto Massano and Samuel Dipaza, of Trenton; George Fazakas, of Burlington County, and Joseph Cutana, of New York.

Joseph Maruca, of Trenton, was sentenced to serve 45 days in the County Jail on a charge of manufacturing liquor.

Andrzej Dizaalo, of Hamilton Township, and Michael Piglione, of Trenton, were each sentenced to serve 15 days for manufacture of liquor. Marziglio Luosito, also of Trenton, was fined \$50 in the same case.

Tony Tasso and John Giovanti, of Trenton, and Steve Morith, of Vine-land, were each sentenced to serve 15 days in jail for manufacture of liquor. They were jointly charged in the same indictment.

## TRENTONIANS INVITED TO U. S. CONFERENCE

Mayor Donnelly is in receipt of a letter from President Hoover in which the President asks Mr. Donnelly to appoint a committee from Trenton to attend the National Conference on Home Building and Home Ownership. The conference, sponsored by Mr. Hoover, will be held in Washington from December 2 to 5.

It is the Mayor's plan to ask members of the City Commission whether they wish to attend or whether they wish to send any of their subordinates to the conference. If they do not, Mr. Donnelly declared he will appoint a number of Trentonians as a committee to go to the meeting.

President Hoover declared that the conference follows a number of studies by committees upon home construction, financing, management, design and city planning and other questions relating to proper operation of homes.

All these questions, said the President, are interlaced with the nation's economic situation. In addition to safeguarding the health, morals, education and efficiency of the nation, said the President, it is hoped through the conference to stimulate building and thus increase employment.

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
