Judge John Boyd Avis, in the United States District Court this afternoon, directed a verdict of acquittal for John J. Kraus, secretary and treasurer of the Kraus Company of Newark, who was charged with using the mails to defraud.

**JUSTICE AS SERIOUS WORK**  
Judge John Boyd Avis and United States Attorney Phillip Forman have taken occasion to commend the Federal Grand Jury which has concluded its labors after having been in session since September. And the commendation is in no wise misplaced. In point of energetic work in behalf of justice, this jury has indeed set an admirable example. Working two days a week instead of one, the body established a record for the Federal district, handing down no less than 99 indictments in a single week and displaying an unprecedented amount of industry.  
Perhaps the panel caught the spirit well exemplified by Judge George M. Bourquin, who has lately returned to his "balliwick" of Butte, Mont., by name Avis and by Mr. Forman himself. a matter of fact, the handling of Federal cases in Trenton has come to be characterized by unusual vigor and surprise on the part of bench and government counsel.  
The net result of the energetic action shown in the Federal building is not to be impeded if everyone participating in it is determined to do a full work and to treat the job as one requiring close attention. It is gratifying to find a Grand Jury cooperating so exemplarily a conception of administration.
