

IT'S BLUE MONDAY FOR DRY VIOLATORS

Judge Fake Imposes Fines
Ranging From \$500
to \$150

It was Blue Monday for liquor law violators yesterday, when they appeared before Federal Judge Fake for sentence. The heaviest fine was that imposed on Mrs. Kate Moskowitz, of Jersey City, who paid \$500 for sale and possession.

Michael Cavalla, of Elizabeth, found guilty last week by a jury, was fined \$150, and sentenced to three months in the Hudson County Jail. Harry De Blicck, of Paterson, likewise had been found guilty, but the jury's recommendation for mercy did not save him from a \$350 fine.

While the liquor cases were being tried, Federal agents were raiding a saloon at 361 South Ninth street, Newark, where they arrested Pietro Di Gianna, of 347 15th avenue, and seized a small quantity of alleged liquor. DiGionna was arraigned before U. S. Commissioner Friedmann, and released on \$1,000 bond.

An indictment against Louis Lesser, Newark attorney; William Reiboldt, of Irvington, and William Berow of New York, charging violation of the national bankruptcy laws, was quashed when the district attorney's office said the chief witnesses in the case, involving the Peerless Blade Co., had fled to Europe.
